


Little Drummer Boy

Did you know that the only reason we say that there were three wise men is that they brought three gifts? And these special gifts—gold, frankincense, and myrrh—tell us much.

When one king visited or sent an ambassador to another, he would give a gift of gold to show that he acknowledged the kingship of the other. The second gift is a type of incense, which was used in Jesus time to worship God. The gift of myrrh is oil used to anoint the dying. So these gifts remind us of Jesus' kingship, divinity, and his dying for us. So what gifts do we have for Jesus? Maybe we can take a hint from the wise men. If we acknowledge Jesus as king, maybe a better gift than gold would be to pledge our obedience to him. A better way than burning incense to pay homage to Jesus' divinity is to take time to pray throughout the day. As for the gift of myrrh, we can give Jesus the crosses we bear each day.

The song "Little Drummer Boy" reminds us that the best gift is not necessarily the most expensive. Instead, it is the simple gift that only we can give. Let Epiphany remind us to offer our lives to Jesus each day.



St. Marguerite Bourgeoys

Born at Troyes, France in 1620, St. Marguerite

consecrated herself to God and became

a missionary. A friend introduced her to the mayor

of Ville Marie (now Montreal) in Canada and, on his invitation, traveled to the New World to teach. With several others, she founded the Congregation of Notre-Dame de Montreal - a non-cloistered teaching order that was formally approved in 1676. By her death in 1700, she was called "Mother of the Colony."



Why was Jesus baptized?

Although sinless Himself, Jesus allowed St. John the Baptist to baptize Him to "fulfill all righteousness" (Matthew 3:15). By this action, Jesus signaled His willingness to take away our sins by His death and bring us new life by His Resurrection. It

was also by His baptism that Jesus instituted Baptism as a Sacrament the Sacrament by which we're sanctified and recreated as children of God. We are mystically baptized into Jesus' death, to be raised by Him in glory.

Reclaim the Name

January is the month traditionally devoted to honoring the holy name of Jesus. What can we do to reclaim reverence for His name in a culture that considers it to be just another word?

Bow your head. "At the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth" (Philippians 2:10). Make a slight, reverent nod whenever you hear Jesus' name in public, in conversation, on TV or in movies.

Offer a prayer. Don't hesitate to ask others not to misuse God's or Jesus' names. If they don't

respond, offer a prayer of reparation: "I kneel before Thee and offer Thee reparation; I would make amends for all the blasphemies uttered against Thy holy name."

> Don't normalize blasphemy. Curate the media you watch, listen to, or sing along with. Avoid songs, shows, or movies in which Jesus's name is disrespected. We are called to strive for holiness, not worldliness. More importantly, it's a way to give Christ the reverence and love He is due.

Mark 1:21-28, What God says happens

In this Gospel passage, Jesus and His apostles entered the synagogue at Capernaum where Jesus taught those gathered on the Sabbath. It was customary for learned teachers to say, "Thus says the Lord..."

Instead Jesus said, "I say to you ... " He taught as one who spoke with the authority of God.

His calm authority astounded Jesus' listeners. Just as they began to wonder what it meant, He gave them a sign. He further demonstrated His authority by performing an exorcism. Spirits that bedeviled an unfortunate man at the synagogue recognized who Jesus was. They were forced to obey Him when He commanded them to depart,

despite their reluctance. In fact, God's power and authority isn't just a formality. What God says, happens.

> Our kind and gentle Savior is also our powerful and awesome Lord. As the Second Person of the Trinity, Jesus has supreme majesty and

we will one day appear before Him to be judged. Yes, He is our divine savior and mediator. But if we say, "Jesus is Lord," then we give Him our loyalty and obedience.

Feasts & Celebrations

January 1 - Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God. When we celebrate this feast, we honor Mary, but also acknowledge Jesus as true God and true Man.

January 8 - Baptism of the Lord (1st Century). Jesus began His public ministry by getting baptized by St. John the Baptist. Jesus was to be baptized to "fulfill all righteousness" (Matthew 3:15). This was also when God reveals Jesus as His "beloved Son" (Matthew 3:17).

January 26 - St. Paula (404). After

her husband - a Roman senator named Toxotius - died, St. Paula gave up her wealthy lifestyle for the Gospel, devoting herself to prayer, poverty, and charitable works. She also befriended and supported St. Jerome in translating the Vulgate.

January 31 - St. John Bosco (1888). Moved by the plight of the young, abandoned boys in Rome, St. John opened the Oratory of St. Francis de Sales and provided workshops for them in shoemaking and tailoring. In 1859, he founded the Salesians who were committed to education and mission work.



What to do & when prayer A feels flat.

"I just don't feel close to God." "Is He really listening?" In fact, God is constantly pursuing us in love, wanting to share His joy with us (Catechism of the Catholic Church, #1). Yet, even the most passionate prayer life can feel flat sometimes. Try these tips to keep

prayer fresh:

Cultivate gratitude. Although God never abandons us, factors like health or mood can affect our prayer. St. Alphonsus

Liguori recommended, "Often recall the loving way in which [God] has acted toward you." Reviewing our blessings helps us appreciate God's love for us over time.

Don't wait to ask for help. God's heart is always opened to us. "Good" prayer happens when we're honest with Him. This is an exercise of faith, which He generously rewards.

Treat Him with love. God wants a relationship of love, respect, and faithfulness with each of us. If prayer feels empty, try treating God with the love, consideration, and tenderness you give and receive from those closest to you. It will make a difference!

St. John Church100 Years Capital Campaign Communications Tidbit

A Roof Over Our Heads - Church roof leaked on Christmas Eve due to the heavy rains

Repeated leaks over 15 years have caused additional structural damage throughout the church. Reroofing is in Phase 1 of the 100 Years Capital Campaign. Phase 1 includes the roof replacement, HVAC replacement, stained glass windows exterior caulking for extensive water leaks and church doors refurbishment for \$1,096.400.

Thank you to the following organizations that have pledged and/or donating toward the 100 Years Capital Campaign:

Brothers' Keeper \$46,950.57 (after having to close operations, their Board voted to

\$25,000 (\$10,000 in 2023; \$5000/year for next 3 years) St. John Altar Society

Catholic Daughters Court St. John \$1000

Businesses in the Plaquemine area that have donated so far are Carville Veterinary Clinic, Purpera Farms and Sugarway Farms.

How can you help?

- Prayerfully consider what you can do to help restore St. John Church as well as continuing your regular tithe that "keeps the lights on." Our goal is to have 95% of us contributing since this is OUR church. As we read in Galatians 6:8-10: "...but the one who sows for the spirit will reap eternal life from the spirit. Let us not grow tired of doing good, for in due time we shall reap our harvest if we do not give up. So then, while we have the opportunity, let us do good to all but especially to those who belong to the family of the faith."
- If you are over 70 1/2 years old, you can make a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) from a traditional or Roth IRA by sending the amount you choose to be withdrawn directly to St. John the Evangelist Church or to the 100 Years Capital Campaign. The QCD may be excluded annually from your taxable income which helps you and the church. Please consult with your tax preparer and/or financial advisor; they can process it for you.
- Your business or your employer may be able to donate as a tax deduction. Please request it and we can help you with the transaction.
- Tithing envelopes are available from the church office. A special envelope is also included in the monthly packet of envelopes you receive each month. 100 Years Capital Campaign contribution forms are available in the church and in the office. Online donations are also possible for both regular tithing and the capital campaign at the church's website www.stjohnchurchplag.org.
