



#### Great Expectations

Christmas can be disappointing. We remember the Christmases from our childhood, all the joy, the excitement, and the fun we had. When we grow up, we have to shop for gifts, write and mail the cards, put up the decorations, and do all the preparations that seem to stress us out. We may be sad that the day did not meet our expectations. Now that most of that is done, we can reflect on how the first Christmas upset all expectations.

I'm sure Joseph never expected to have a child so soon. And those Jews who looked forward to the coming of a Messiah never expected him to come as a baby. Yet God had his reasons for coming in this way. Jesus was born in a stable because no one had room for him. The first to see him were the shepherds, the migrant workers of the time. The political leaders (Herod and friends) wanted to kill him.

Jesus was born in this way to show that he came not for the

important and wealthy, but for the poor and outcast. So today he continues to come to us in the homeless, the illegal alien, the sick, those in prison, the unborn infant, that we might find him where we least expect. Can we learn to see him in the unexpected, in our trials and difficulties, our own weaknesses? When we do, we will celebrate what Christmas is truly about. Tom Schmidt





## Pastor's Letter

December 29, 2024

Dear Family:

Merry Christmas to you and your families from our School and Parish Staff, Deacon Ricard, Mrs. Schlatre, Mrs. Morel, Mrs. Dupont and myself.

As people have married into my large Sicilian-American/Cajun family, I have tried to help them make sense of the many relationships. Generations of first, second, and third cousins number into the hundreds. Within this web of blood relations are several "branch-crossing" personal friendships. Some people are closer to their distant relatives than to siblings. Complicating everything are the "relatives" with no blood relationship but who have been grafted in through long association. Newcomers are easily intimidated by the complexity; one of my cousins even made a scorecard and map for his fiancée the first time she came to a family reunion. They've been married over twenty years now, but sometimes she will still pull it out at events.

Large and open family structure characterized early Israel, as is seen especially in the Book of Genesis. More importantly, God had a family as well. People who served the Lord, such as Eli and Samuel in today's first reading, were thought to be members of God's household as well as that of their human family. Early Christians used this traditional idea to talk about Jesus' relationship to God, most notable in today's Gospel reading. When Jesus speaks of his Father's house, he makes a double entendre, speaking of the temple building but also of his place in God's household.

Early Christians understood Jesus to be the head-of-household of the family of the Church. For example, Jesus' relationship to the twelve apostles resembles a kind of brotherhood. Grafted to his family, they joined him for Passover, attempted (but failed) to protect him, and became heirs to his Spirit. In today's second reading, Jesus plays the role of the head of the family not just to the twelve but to all who follow him [1 Jn 3:1-2]. As we find our place in the large and fractious family of the Church, we can be confident that Christ is looking out for us, protecting and providing as we serve his mission.

Some questions for reflection: Where is your place in God's household? How do you serve Christ's mission? How has Christ provided for you as a member of his family?

Many thanks to the members of our parish family; the men, women, boys and girls who gave their time and love to the ministry of decorating our beautiful Church. Your ministry makes our church such a wonderful place for our parishioners and pilgrims who come here to pray. Thanks as well for all our Liturgical Ministers. Thanks to our Sacristans and the Loaves and Fishes ministry who help our bereaved parishioners. May God grant us many blessings this Christmas Season.

## The Sacrament of Confirmation Age Change

#### **Frequently Asked Questions**

For some time, clergy and parish catechetical leaders have expressed a desire to lower the age of Confirmation. The two collective reasons as articulated by Bishop Duca are:

- 1. A strong desire to offer the graces of the sacrament to young people earlier and in closer proximity to their baptism.
- 2. To prepare young people and their families at a less busy time of their lives. As our youth enter adolescence, their schedules, involvements, commitments and pastoral needs increase in degree and complexity. Inviting young people to receive those strengthening graces at an earlier time will help fortify them as they encounter the trials and challenges of young adulthood.


